ASSOCIATION OF BUSINESS TRIAL LAWYERS, ORANGE COUNTY CHAPTER (ABTL-OC)

The Association of Business Trial Lawyers (ABTL), founded over forty years ago, has five thriving chapters across California. ABTL provides a forum in which litigators and judges meet to address issues important to business trial lawyers. Judicial participation in ABTL programs and events is very strong, in part because ABTL includes both plaintiff and defense perspectives.

The Orange County Chapter (ABTL-

OC) provides top quality programs, combined with social hours where colleagues can meet with each other and with judges. ABTL-OC's January program was entitled "Sargon The Gatekeeper" and featured members of the bench, bar, and professional community discussing the introduction and exclusion of financial expert witness testimony. In March, "Opening Statement Techniques from the Masters" featured renowned litigators performing opening statements and sharing their tips and techniques. In April and May, ABTL-OC co-presented updates with Orange County Superior Court leadership regarding COVID-19's impact on the courts and legal education on how COVID-19 is affecting juror attitudes. Previously, ABTL-OC hosted Justice Kathleen O'Leary interviewing California Supreme Court Chief Justice Tani Cantil-Sakauye and Associate Justice Carol Corrigan. Other past programs included "Ready for Trial, Your Honor" with Judge James Di Cesare, Judge John Gastelum, Judge Peter Wilson, and Judge Josephine Staton; "Business Crimes" presented by District Attorney Todd Spitzer, Deputy District Attorneys Kelly Ernby and Nick Miller, and Assistant US Attorney Vib Mittal; "Artificial Intelligence and Its Impact on the Legal Profession"; and insights from four general counsel representing Facebook, Oracle, El Pollo Loco, and Edwards Lifesciences. Going forward in 2020, until resuming in-person programs, ABTL-OC will present a number of webinars, both OC-centric and statewide through partnership with its other chapters. In addition to its dinner programs,

ABTL is known for its unmatched statewide Annual Seminars. In 2021, ABTL will hold its members only Annual Seminar at the Mauna Lani resort on the Big Island of Hawaii. The Annual Seminar usually draws approximately 400 attendees and offers eight hours of CLE credit to lawyers and judges from across the state.

ABTL-OC also is dedicated to mentoring and education for its "Young Lawyer Division" (YLD), which is defined as those practicing ten years or fewer. Finally, ABTL-OC is devoted to giving back to the Orange County community. Each year, ABTL-OC participates in building at least one house for Habitat for Humanity. ABTL-OC also hosts its holiday gift-giving opportunity, where attendees participate by donating money to select children's charities or by donating new stuffed animals to the Orange County Superior Court's adoption program. Robert Jameson, Judge David McEachen, Judge Ronald Kreber, Judge Dan Pratt, Judge Franz Miller, Judge Michael Brenner, Judge Andrew Banks, Judge Lon Hurwitz, and Justice William Bedsworth. For the first time last year we granted the initial Founder's Award at Samhain Eve to Attorney Ronald Schwartz.

We have organized MCLE travel seminars to Ireland, Scotland, Iceland, France, Italy, England, Spain, Iceland, and Wales. We announce our next MCLE trip to Helsinki and Vilnius in October 2020. We have also had excursions to the contemporary Irish comedies and plays, as well as the Orange County Irish Fair, the Renaissance Faire, and Irish and Celtic movies.

More than 300 lawyers and judges rally to our cause. One does not have to be of Celtic descent to join the CBA. ORANGE COUNTY KOREAN AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION (OCKABA)

Orange County Korean American Bar Association (OCKABA) was established in 2005 to foster meaningful relationships among Korean-American lawyers and law students, to provide pro bono services to the Orange County Korean-American community, and to promote the appointment of Korean-American judges. Over the past fifteen years, with the help and support of the OCBA and other affiliate bars, OCKABA has grown significantly as an organization in a number of ways.

To start, OCKABA reached record highs in terms of attendance and sponsorship for the annual Installation Dinner, which took place at the headquarters of KIA Motors America last October. OCKABA had the privilege of honoring Don Liu (the Chief Legal Officer and Executive Vice President for Target Corporation) as the keynote speaker, and Mr. Liu's speech about the need for greater diversity and inclusion in the legal profession was, by all accounts, exceptionally inspirational. For this year's Installation Dinner—assuming it will be safe to do so, in view of the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic—OCKABA plans to honor Judge Lucy H. Koh (U.S. District Judge for the Northern District of California), who presided over the *Apple v. Samsung* smartphone litigation.

In addition, OCKABA's overall membership has grown to nearly 200 active members for the first time this year. In response to this growth, OCKABA revamped its leadership structure to form committees that will help meet the needs of various member groups. For example, the Community Outreach Committee-chaired by Christina Ahn (Parker and Lynch)-is planning an event geared toward our members who are solo practitioners or lawyers at small firms, especially those members who work in North Orange County and have a difficult time driving down through traffic to attend events in South Orange County.
