

John Paul Stevens made an indelible mark on American jurisprudence. Considered a conservative when nominated by Gerald Ford in 1975 but called the "chief justice of the liberal Supreme Court" in the early 2000s, Justice Stevens authored monumental opinions dramatically shaping the law. For instance, Justice Stevens crafted the "Chevron doctrine" that dominated administrative law for decades until its recent repudiation by the Supreme Court. And he issued a notable dissent in Bush v. Gore. As the third-longest serving Supreme Court justice in history, Justice Stevens's legacy is a profound topic for reflection.
